Background

The California legislature revised the state's open meeting laws, or the Brown Act, in response to the COVID-19 State of Emergency which ended in early 2023. Since the pandemic, the Brown Act has been amended to codify modern teleconference meeting practices. SB 707 (Durazo, 2025) sets out the latest Brown Act revisions.

Summary

Beginning January 1, 2026, CAC members may attend up to two meetings per year from a remote location without making the location accessible to the public for "just cause," as defined below:

1. Childcare or caregiving to child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, domestic partner; or
2. Contagious illness that prevents in person attendance; or
3. Mental or physical need not subject to reasonable accommodation provisions; or
4. Travel while on official business of RCEA or another state or local agency; or
5. Immunocompromised child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner that requires remote participation; or
6. Physical or family medical emergency; or
7. Military service obligations. "Emergency circumstance" due to a physical or family medical emergency that prevents the member from attending in person.

A vote is not necessary for a member to attend remotely for just cause, but the following requirements must be fulfilled:

1. At the beginning of the meeting, the remotely participating CAC member provides a brief description of the just cause reason, protecting the member's (or family member's) medical privacy;
2. Meeting minutes reflect the specific just cause reason;
3. Member participates through audio and visual means, unless a physical condition results in the member's need to participate off camera;
4. Member discloses individuals 18 years or older present in the room, and the general nature of their relationship with the CAC member;



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5. At least a quorum of the CAC must participate from one or more physical locations within Humboldt County that are publicly accessible and noticed on the meeting agenda;
6. If disruption in teleconference service occurs, the meeting must be discontinued until teleconference service is restored;
7. Votes are conducted by roll call; and
8. Member may participate remotely due to just cause up to two times per year.

If the CAC member needs to participate remotely for more than 2 meetings per year or for non-just cause reasons, staff recommends arranging for a publicly and ADA-accessible space with visual and audio meeting capabilities from which to participate in keeping with pre-COVID Brown Act teleconference meeting requirements.

Staff asks to be notified one-week in advance of remote meeting attendance so the member's publicly and ADA accessible remote meeting address can be published in the agenda, as may be required by the Brown Act.

In addition to expanded "just cause" teleconference meeting participation guidelines, SB 707 codified reasonable accommodation measures for CAC members with physical or mental disabilities, as defined under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Members living with these disabilities may participate remotely from non-public locations. Their participation will be treated as in-person attendance at the physical meeting location, including for quorum purposes. Reasonable accommodation participation requires the following:

1. CAC member must use audio and visual technology, unless their physical condition results in needing to participate off camera; and
2. Member must disclose individuals 18 years old or older present in the room and disclose the general nature of their relationship to the member.

These reasonable accommodation requirements supersede all other teleconferencing requirements.

Alignment with RCEA's Strategic Plan

N/A - Compliance with the Brown Act is a transparency requirement for California local public agencies.

Equity Impacts

SB 707 author Senator Maria Elena Durazo stated an intention for the bill to increase public meeting participation. The bill's measures increase civic engagement opportunities for people facing barriers due to disability and distance from meeting locations by using technology that was widely adopted during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Financial Impact

Procurement and staff time related to complying with Brown Act requirements are included in the current fiscal year budget.

Meeting (Call to Order)

1. Open

Vice Chair Leonardi called the hybrid in-person and teleconference meeting to order on the above date at 6 p.m. at the Jefferson Community Center and the Mid-Klamath Watershed Council Building (remote, public meeting location). The meeting agenda was posted on July 9, 2026. Vice Chair Leonardi

welcomed new CAC members Carol Schmitt and Hope Sakho, who introduced themselves and described their backgrounds in low-income housing electrification and Tribal energy sovereignty.

2. Non-Agenda Item Public Comment

There were no non-agenda item public comments received for this meeting.

3. Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Burks reported that CAC comments were forwarded to the Board and considered in the development of RCEA's Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) filing. The Board selected a policy-focused portfolio that maintains RCEA's renewable and carbon-free goals and retains biomass energy for now. Staff noted that the IRP is a non-binding, 20-year planning document.

Staff reviewed the draft Humboldt Bay Area Plan update for alignment with RCEA strategic goals and found broad consistency, particularly related to offshore wind development and harbor infrastructure planning. Staff's comments requested more specific plans regarding energy-efficient design, reduction of vehicle miles traveled and natural gas line elimination.

Recruitment has begun for RCEA's Director of Engagement and Regional Climate Planning. The director will oversee community engagement efforts, supervise the Regional Climate Action Plan Administrator, support offshore wind engagement, and serve as the primary staff liaison to the CAC.

Executive Director Burks introduced Regulatory and Legislative Policy Intern Giovanna Signorelli. There was no public comment.

4. Consent Calendar

3.1. Approve March 10, 2026, CAC Meeting Minutes.

Neither CAC members nor members of the public requested Consent Calendar item discussion.

Motion Dukes, Second Johnson: Approve March 10, 2026, CAC Meeting Minutes.

The motion passed with a unanimous roll call vote: Ayes: Bell, Dukes, Fordham, Johnson, Latimer, Leonardi, Mann, Sakho, Schmitt. Noes: None. Abstain: None. Absent: Lawton.

6. Fiscal Year 2026-2027 Update

Executive Director Burks and Business Planning and Finance Director Biondini explained that RCEA electricity generation rates will be higher than PG&E's generation portion of the bill for the first time. Staff asked the CAC to help explain the increase to the community. At the upcoming Board meeting, staff will propose an increase to the generation part of customers' electricity bills. For reference, a 6% generation increase means roughly less than \$3 more per month for an average residential electricity bill.

Staff explained that the Power Charge Indifference Adjustment (PCIA) doubled in the past year and makes up over half of RCEA customers' generation charges. Power costs decreased by 1/3 earlier this year, benefiting customers but when combined with the PCIA increase hurt RCEA's ability to cover power costs and keep rates lower than PG&E's. The RCEA Board is committed to maintaining a 100% renewable and carbon-free portfolio, preserving core customer programs, coordinating regional climate

action planning and maintaining RCEA's financial viability. The generation rate increase will help RCEA meet the Board's goals and keep financial reserves high enough to avoid power transaction fees.

Committee members discussed customer impacts, opt-out risks, and communications strategies. When discussing the rate change with the community, staff emphasized the need to explain RCEA's benefits to Humboldt County residents: local control and transparency, a higher renewable energy content portfolio than PG&E, local customer programs paid for mostly by funds brought back to the County by RCEA staff, and advocacy efforts on behalf of Humboldt County residents. Up to now, RCEA customers have saved between \$5 and \$7 million compared with what they would have paid as PG&E customers.

Regulatory and Legislative Manager Carlson explained the PCIA, its origins and effect on community choice aggregators throughout California. Committee members discussed how the PCIA fee sunsets in all other states with CCAs, but not in California. Staff reviewed ongoing PCIA reform legislative and regulatory efforts, including CPUC Assembly Bill 1761. Committee members suggested educational materials, tribal engagement, city council outreach, and future legislative updates.

Member of the public Marty Smukler asked whether the rate increase would impact solar and commercial customers. The proposed changes would not alter solar programs and would apply across customer classes. Vice Chair Leonardi closed the public comment period.

7. CPUC Energy Efficiency Program Survey

Customer Programs Director Kullmann explained how regional energy networks like the Northern Rural Energy Network (NREN) fills gaps in investor-owned utility provided energy efficiency services. RCEA, and more recently NREN, help bring funds Humboldt County customers pay into the Public Purpose Program back to the county in the form of energy efficiency services.

The CPUC is asking for community input on how to evaluate NREN's efficiency and electrification programs in the rural areas it serves. Committee members discussed the need to include measures beyond energy savings alone that reflect the needs of rural and underserved communities. Member suggestions included: contractor education and workforce development measures; long-term customer assistance measures including phone support for new technology adopters; deployment of renewable backup power generation programs to serve people in remote areas with unreliable electricity service; and arguing against disposal requirements for previous generation equipment for low-income rural customers.

Staff requested that members complete and return the CPUC survey individually. There were no public comments on this item.

9. Close & Adjourn

Vice Chair Leonardi adjourned the meeting at 7:51 p.m.

Subject	Customer Programs Overview with Focus on Heat Pumps

Summary

Prior to launching Community Choice Energy in 2017, the Redwood Coast Energy Authority was formed in 2003 to provide energy efficiency and greenhouse gas reduction services to member agencies and their constituents. Throughout this time, RCEA has leveraged numerous funding sources to offer programs and services to all customer sectors, continuously expanding its reach and engagement and advocating for greater equity in energy efficiency programs in rural California. Over this time, air-sourced heat pump technology has grown in importance as a tool to increase building efficiency, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and improve indoor air quality and comfort.

Background

RCEA's Customer Programs Department is led by a Department Director, with three Program Managers, four full-time and one part-time Analysts, three Specialists, and one Assistant, all focused on serving the Humboldt Community and predominantly funded through sources outside of RCEA's CCE revenue. The main source of funding is RCEA's Northern Rural Energy Network initiative, but programs are also funded through the longstanding Redwood Coast Energy Watch partnership with PG&E and various competitive grants such as the Rural Resilience Partnership Grant. In addition to procuring customer program funding for RCEA, Customer Programs staff have assisted in acquiring many millions of dollars in state and federal grants and low interest financing for multiple Humboldt County jurisdictions and schools.

RCEA Customer Program Offerings

Heat Pumps:

Heat pumps have become an increasingly important tool for promoting energy efficiency and greenhouse gas reductions. According to the Humboldt County Regional Climate Action Plan, building energy makes up approximately 14 percent of Humboldt's GHG profile. Of that, approximately 13 percent of building energy emissions are due to the use of natural gas and one percent due to indirect emissions associated with electricity use. Heat Pumps are used for space and water heating, clothes dryers, and pool heaters.

Heat pumps are not new technology. Air conditioners and refrigerators are both forms of heat pumps. Heat pumps use the thermodynamic properties of a compressed liquid, called a refrigerant, to move heat from one location to another. In the case of a refrigerator, heat is moved from inside the refrigerator and released through the coils on the back. For a heat pump hot water heater, heat is removed from the ambient air and released into the water storage tank. Heat pump space heaters, which can be either ducted central units or individual "mini-split" units, can act as both heaters and air conditioners, either moving heat from outside to inside, or the opposite.

Because heat pumps use electricity to pump and compress the refrigerant rather than create heat, they are considerably more efficient than combustion or electric resistance heaters, and when replacing natural gas or propane combustion heaters can greatly improve indoor air quality.

RCEA has been offering direct customer rebates for heat pump space heaters, water heaters, and dryers through NREN and previous programs and is launching a partner contractor installation program with higher incentives.

Equity Impacts

RENs in general, and the Northern Rural Energy Network in particular, are designed to reach customers that otherwise are not being reached by existing ratepayer-funded programs. The NREN programs will ensure that hard-to-reach, disinvested, disadvantaged, and underserved rural customers are provided with an equitable level of services and support of CPUC energy programs and are empowered to take action to better manage their energy use and cost through increased awareness, support resources, a trained workforce, and access to financing to improve their homes and businesses.

Financial Impact

RCEA Customer Programs have brought millions of dollars in customer program funding to Humboldt County that would otherwise have gone to other parts of the state.

Background

When authorizing extension of RCEA's power purchase agreement (PPA) for biomass energy with Humboldt Sawmill Company (HSC) in April 2021, RCEA's Board directed staff to "periodically review the contract...assessing current alternate biomass uses and other environmental considerations." To create a framework for the requested periodic review, staff negotiated a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between RCEA and HSC, which the RCEA Board adopted in September 2021. One provision of the MOU is as follows:

Annually on or around May 1 and continuing until the termination of the PPA, representatives of the Parties will meet to review the terms of the PPA and to discuss the continued viability of biomass power production by the HSC facility relative to other potential or actual uses of the biomass feedstock by HSC or other entities.

The MOU also calls for HSC to provide data on plant performance on request; types, quantities, and sources of biomass feedstock; and plant emissions. HSC have generally been responsive to specific data requested by RCEA staff under the MOU.

As a reminder, the MOU's purpose is not to terminate or otherwise override the terms of the PPA. As the MOU states: "This MOU does not and is not intended to supersede, replace, or subordinate any provisions, representations, covenants, rights, or obligations in the PPA." While the MOU does not allow for early termination of the biomass PPA, it could help form a pathway for alternative use of the biomass plant's feedstock material once the current PPA's term expires.

Summary

Data provided for the past reporting year included:

- An updated table providing data requested by RCEA, including:
 - Monthly amounts of biomass feedstock, broken down by geographic origin (inside or outside Humboldt County) and supplier (sourced internally from Humboldt Redwood Company or Mendocino Redwood Company or externally)
 - Monthly use of biomass and auxiliary diesel fuel, electric output to RCEA and for onsite use, and thermal energy recovered for industrial use



- Annual total emissions of greenhouse gases (biogenic and non-biogenic) and a number of criteria pollutants
- A set of “Co-Gen Monthly Monitoring Reports” filed with the North Coast Unified Air Quality Management District (Air District) by HSC that disclose startup and shutdown events, equipment breakdowns and malfunctions, and emergency events. The reports include extensive tables of emissions data for the plant at hourly or more frequent intervals.
- Quarterly opacity reports providing data from opacity sensors in the boiler stacks to confirm the sensors are working properly.
- Quarterly cylinder gas audits on the plant’s continuous emission monitoring systems in each boiler’s stack to confirm the monitoring systems are working properly.
- A throughput report showing monthly total amounts of steam produced and amounts of biomass and diesel fuel combusted for each of the plant’s boilers.

In addition to the data provided by HSC, there are three items of special note this year.

- HSC reported that they received no new notices of violation from the Air District in the past reporting year. This was the first reporting year since the MOU reporting cycle began in 2021 that HSC has had no notices of violation.
- RCEA requested and received from the Air District a draft Health Risk Assessment (HRA) Report prepared for HSC at the Air District’s direction by Landau Associates. The assessment, which was conducted per the Air Toxics “Hot Spots” Information and Assessment Act of 1987 (Assembly Bill 2588) and delivered to the Air District on June 15, 2026, modeled and quantified impacts of HSC plant emissions on health of populations near the plant. The draft report found that cancer risks fall below the Air District’s notification or remediation thresholds. The draft report is subject to review and revision by the Air District and the State-level Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment before receiving final approval.
- The US EPA issued an order denying petition dated May 5, 2026, in response to the January 1, 2025, petition from the Environmental Protection Information Center and the Humboldt Coalition for Clean Energy that staff reported to the CAC last year. That petition had asked the EPA to object to the Title V operating permit issued to HSC by the Air District.

The fifth annual meeting between RCEA and HSC staff per the MOU took place at HSC’s Scotia headquarters on June 16, 2026. The materials listed above were reviewed, and HSC management described improvements they have recently made at the plant to improve efficiency and reduce emissions. For example, they noted that capping off a steam line that is no longer needed reduced cold startup time following extended shutdowns from ten hours to five hours, reducing the amount of diesel needed as auxiliary fuel during these startups.

RCEA staff reviewed the materials provided by HSC and then shared them with members of the Biomass Technical Advisory Group (BTAG). RCEA staff attempted to convene a meeting of BTAG to discuss the HSC materials, but were unable to identify a date and time this summer when more than a very small number of members were available to attend. Staff instead asked the BTAG members to provide written comments on the materials and provided a follow-up reminder. No comments were received prior to publication of this report, other than HSC leadership indicating they had no responses to the prompts provided.



The materials provided by HSC, the draft Health Risk Assessment provided by NCUAQMD, and the US EPA's order denying petition are available for review on the Energy Sources page of RCEA's website at <https://redwoodenergy.org/about/energy-sources/> under the "Local Biomass Energy" subheading.

Staff asked at the annual meeting what progress HSC has made on their ongoing investigation of alternative uses for their biomass plant feedstock. HSC leadership reported that they have continued to investigate alternative biomass uses at their Mendocino County facility, but to date they have not committed to move forward with development of a new project, given the currently poor economics of the alternatives they have evaluated.

Alignment with RCEA's Strategic Plan

RCEA's consultations with HSC in implementing the terms of the MOU are in keeping with the following strategies in the RePower Humboldt plan:

- 4.1.11.3 Investigate the Impacts of Biomass Emissions
- 4.1.11.6 Plan for a Long-Term Transition Away from Direct Combustion of Forest Derived Biomass and Toward Lower-Impact Uses of this Material

Review of HSC's reporting by BTAG is in keeping with the RePower Humboldt plan's direction:

- 4.1.11.4 Establish a Biomass Technical Advisory Committee
